UNESCO and Inclusive Urban Policies

Since 1996, UNESCO has been promoting the flagship principle of "Humanising the City" in close cooperation with UN-HABITAT Global Governance Campaign and UNDESA (United Nations Department for Economic and Social Affairs) to contribute to the United Nations Social Summit Declaration in Copenhagen *Creating Inclusive Societies* (1995), the Istanbul Declaration on Human Settlements (1996), as well as the Millennium Development Goals.

Within the framework of the United Nations Human Rights Approach to Development proposed in September 2005 by UN Secretary-General, UNESCO Urban Development Programme has contributed to create urban public policies which respect, protect and promote inclusiveness, social cohesion and local democracy. This work is based on the development of multi-disciplinary knowledge and comparative research, on capacity-building of urban professionals and civil society while focusing on raising awareness levels of national and local governments.

Considering the specificity of the Indian urban context, UNESCO New Delhi is currently developing a training tool for city professionals, *UNESCO – UN-HABITAT Historic Districts for All: A Social and Human Approach to Sustainable Revitalisation – A Guide for Urban Actors in India*, that will be launched at the 5th World Urban Forum (March 2010, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil). The Guide aims to document criteria and guidelines, best practices, texts and resources, experts and academic networks, NGOs and research institutions that can help local authorities implement revitalization projects in historical urban areas.

In collaboration with UN-HABITAT, the Institute of Social Sciences (ISS), the Italian Embassy Cultural Centre (Istituto Italiano di Cultura-IIC), the School of Planning and Architecture (SPA), UNESCO Chair on Social Sustainability of Historical Districts (Space Group – Yonsei University, Seoul, Republic of Korea) and UNESCO Chair on Social and Spatial Inclusion of Migrants: Urban Policies and Practices (IUAV, University of Venice, Italy), UNESCO, from 24 September to 1 October 2009, is organizing, and contributing to, a number of events and activities related to urban inclusive policies and practices in India, within the framework of its Social and Human Sciences programme.
